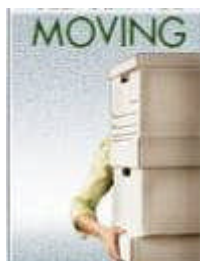

MGS Library is Moving



The Minnesota Genealogical Society Library is leaving Golden Valley and moving to Suite 200 (2nd floor), 1185 Concord St. N. in South St Paul at the end of October 2007.

The new location has slightly more floor space than the current location. Included is the use of an auditorium on the first floor and a large boardroom on the top (fourth) floor, by reservation.

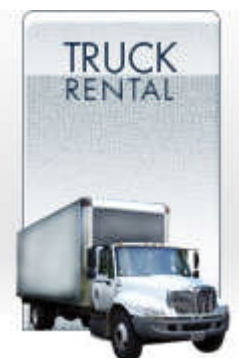
The landlord will then be re-carpeting and otherwise improving the space in preparation for our arrival on or about November 1. MGS has a five-year lease with the option of a three year extension.

The location is in northern Dakota County, near the Dakota County Genealogical Society. The Minnesota History Center and its library in downtown Saint Paul are only four miles to the north.



1185 Concord Street is the former CENEX headquarters, and is easy to find, south of I-94 or north of I-494. It has a distinctive exterior, with multi-colored squares that cause some people to refer to it as the 'Rubik's Cube' building. The parking lot accommodates well over 100 vehicles, with overflow parking across the street. The new location can be reached by a #71 bus, that runs north and south from Arkwright Street to Concord Street, and stops right at 1185.

According to the current plans, the MGS library will be closed from October 25 through November 9 to allow for packing, moving, unpacking and setting up. A moving company has been hired to do the heavy packing, lifting, and hauling, but MGS and branch members will need to help with smaller, loose and miscellaneous items. The Golden Valley location will be open regular hours through October 24, but you may find a few things at the library packed up and/or moved about as preparatory work is done.



Are you attending the December 1st MGS meeting and program at Fort Snelling? You are encouraged to stop by the new MGS location after the program. MGS plans to be open that afternoon and are planning to arrange a welcoming open house for all.

Where We're Going

As most of you have heard many times in the past CGHSM is having problems recruiting enough volunteers to keep the organization active.

We are currently short one Member at large for the Board of Directors. We do not have a volunteer willing to coordinate membership meetings, workshops and other activities. In addition the end of the year will find us short two Members at large, a treasurer and a Vice President.

We have decided to try to keep CGHSM operational at least until the end of 2008 with the hope that the move to South St Paul will provide us with more volunteers.

To accomplish this we are simplifying our organizational structure and changing the constitution/bylaws to more accurately reflect the organization.

1. Elected officials will be nominated and voted for at the Annual meeting (November).

4. The requirement for the Board of Directors has been changed to President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Past President. Members at Large can be elected but are not required.
5. Meeting will be quarterly with a Business Meeting followed by a Membership Meeting and held February, May, August, and November on the third Sunday from 1 to 4PM. The November Meeting will be the Annual meeting.
6. The newsletter "Cousins et Cousines" will be distributed quarterly three weeks prior to the scheduled meeting, providing we have material to print.

CGHSM Immediate Needs

The society cannot function without officers. Please consider volunteering for one of the following positions immediately.

Vice President – In the absence of the President, the Vice President serves as President. The Vice President also fills other duties requested by the President or prescribed by the Board of Directors. The Vice President maintains a register of membership renewal program.

Treasurer – The Treasurer maintains a record of all financial transactions and presents a financial report at each of the Regular Society meetings. The Treasurer prepares and files quarterly financial statements with the Treasurer of MGS. The Treasurer makes records available for audit at the end of each fiscal year.

Canadian Day at MGS and Miles Luke

Canadian Genealogical & Heritage Society of Minnesota volunteers continue to staff the Minnesota Genealogical library, every second Wednesday of the month.

On June 13th, member Miles Luke from Monroe, Louisiana, visited the library and shared many interesting stories about his French Canadian ancestry. Miles and his wife Vivian travel to Wisconsin and Minnesota most every summer.

Miles Luke was born in Frederic, Wisconsin, October 7, 1919. His father was a banker and when the crash came, and a lot of banks closed, his father's bank closed as well. The family then moved to Minneapolis in the fall of 1930. Miles graduated from high school in Brainerd, Minnesota, in 1937. He married a Sparta, Wisconsin girl, Vivian Harris, whom he met at the business college in Minneapolis. They were married on February 14, 1942.

In July of 1942, Miles entered the military and served our country for 25 years until his retirement in February of 1967. His last duty station was at Barksdale Air Force Base in Louisiana, which is how he came to live in Louisiana over the last 40 years. He then worked in the Economic Development field, first with the State of Louisiana and then for Economic Development Foundations. He retired at age 80 and now does volunteer work.

Miles activities include canoeing, mountain climbing and bicycling. He belongs to the Highpointers Club, which has 3,000 members. Each year the club holds a climb and meeting at some of the United State's highest points. He has been to the highest point in 26 of the 50 states including Eagle Mountain in Minnesota, Mount Driskill in Louisiana and Mount Elbert in Colorado. Miles notes that he hasn't made it to the top of Mount Elbert yet, which he has tried twice, but is getting close! He is currently on his way to the highest point in Wisconsin at Timms Hill, and attending a Club banquet in the Wausau area. He doesn't expect to do many more state highpoints at his age, but sure has had fun.

Miles and Vivian have been married for over 65 years. They raised 3 daughters, two of which are Southern born, and have 5 grandchildren and 1 great grandson, all of whom live in Louisiana. He considers himself a lucky man.

Miles has graciously agreed to write some articles for Cousins and Cousines. The following is the first, in what we hope, will be a series of articles about our Canadian ancestors.

Chief White Cloud. Indian name Wabanaquot

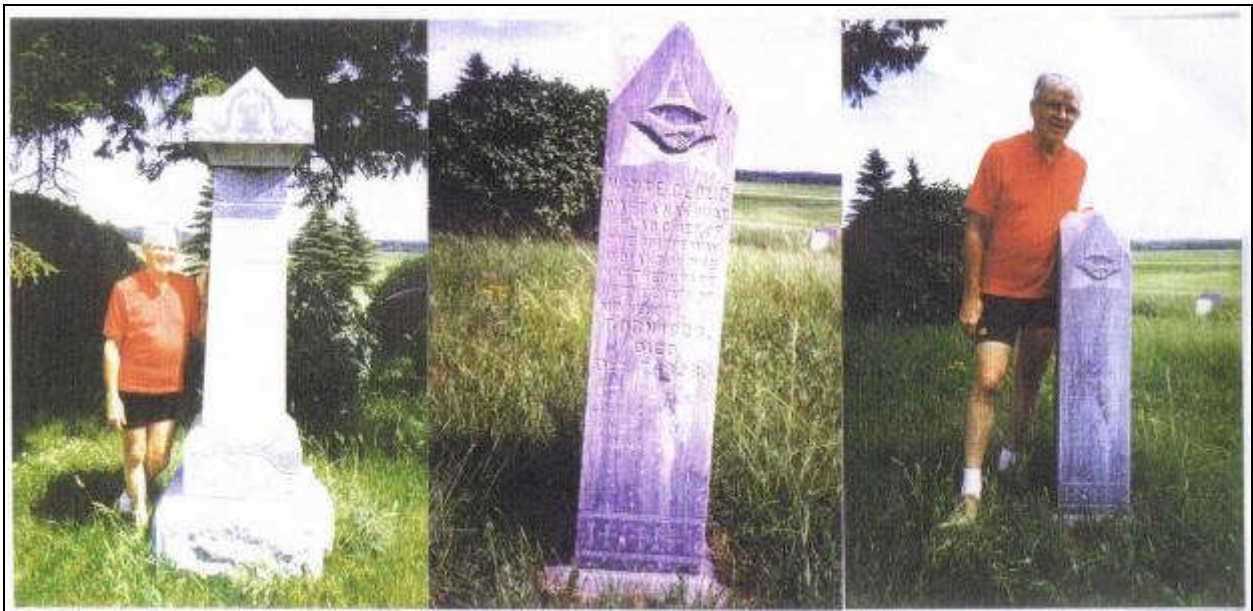
Miles K. Luke, Monroe, Louisiana — July 15, 2007

Chief White Cloud, whose Indian name was Wabanaquot, was chief of the Chippewa Indian Reservation at Gull Lake and later at White Earth. He was born in 1825 and died on October 7, 1898 and is buried at White Earth, Minnesota.

As a child, growing up in a small town in Northern Wisconsin, my Mother always said that we kids were part Chippewa Indian from the White Earth Indian Reservation and that we were related to him. We never did go look for his grave. Many years later and after retiring I started to do some research. I found out that White Cloud was a Chief of the Chippewa tribe at White Earth Reservation which is not far from Mahanomen, Minnesota.

In 1994 my wife Vivian and I decided to go to the headwaters of the Mississippi River at Itasca State Park and also go to the White Earth Reservation to see if we could find out anything.. So, we drove from Louisiana where we live and found a cemetery behind a church at White Earth. We walked all over the place, got royally bitten with mosquitoes, but found no grave marker that would indicate that White Cloud was buried there. So we gave up and drove to Lake Itasca and enjoyed the park, saw an eagle soaring and walked across the headwaters of the Mississippi where it flows out of beautiful Lake Itasca.

I finally struck gold. I am a bicyclist and in 1995 I signed up with a cycle tour group to do a six day bicycle tour thru Minnesota starting in Fargo and ending up in Cannon Falls a distance of just under 500 miles. I took Amtrak from Sparta, Wisconsin (Vivian's home town) to Fargo, N.D. Two other cyclists from our local bicycle club in Monroe, Louisiana drove up and joined me on the tour.

The first days ride was from Fargo to Mahanomen, a distance of 68 miles, where we spent the night camping at the high school. I noticed that we were not far from White Earth, so after getting our camping gear out of the support truck and getting settled, I secured a vehicle and the three of us drove down to White Earth. We looked the same cemetery over again like we did the

year before. Found nothing and then asked an Indian lady if perhaps there might be another cemetery in the community. Yes, there was one just about a mile West of town on a high plateau. That is where I struck gold. Before even getting out of the car after going through the cemetery archway, we saw two grave monuments with Chief White Cloud's name on the stones. I was ecstatic. We took several pictures and made notes of the inscriptions. The inscription on the smaller monument says:

I owe a debt of gratitude to Ruth Charest for helping to trace my lineage to White Cloud.

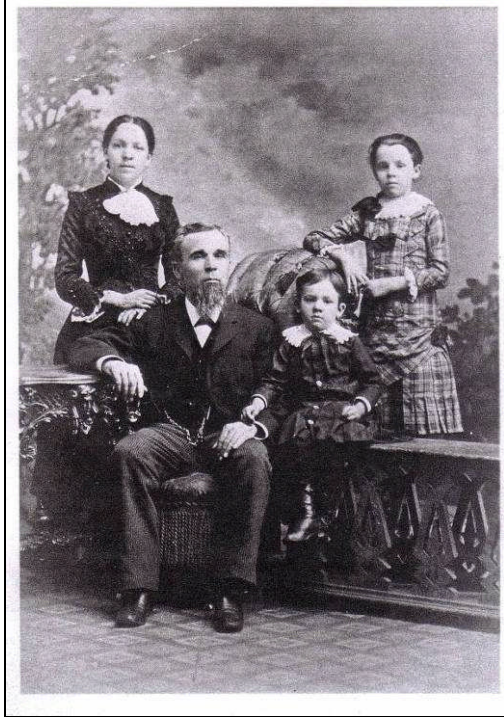

Changing Trains at St. Paul Junction

Louis Laramee came to Minnesota in 1857. He returned to his hometown of St. Lin near Montreal to marry Alphonsine Davis, age 17. The name Davis was of Welch origin, but that family had been in Quebec for generations and was culturally and by marriage, thoroughly French-Canadian. Louis (Fissiau dit) Laramee had become a successful harness maker and dealer in tack in Minneapolis. He was a founder of St. Clothilde, a second French-Canadian Catholic church (now St Anne's), and the co-proprietor with Zepherin Demeules of Echo d'Ouest, the French language newspaper of Minnesota.

Changing Trains at St. Paul Junction.

LARAMEE-DAVIS.-On September 13, 1870, in Montreal, Canada East,
by Rev. M. Chongon, Mr. Louis Laramee, of the firm of
Greely, Loye & Co. to Miss Alphonsine Davis.

An interesting incident occurred last evening to a newly wedded couple coming from far off Canada to Minneapolis, the parties to the occurrence were our friends L. Laramee and his beautiful bride. When the St. Paul train started off, Mr. Laramee, who was upon the platform, glanced inside the train for this city but did not observe his wife. Thinking she must be in the St. Paul car he ran after it, but the locomotive was too rapid even for Love's fleet feet and the train gained on him. Finding he was unable to reach it, he turned to get on the Minneapolis train, but, imagine his amazement on seeing it also passing beyond him. The lady, who is French, and is unable to speak a word of English and unacquainted with anyone on the train, became considerably alarmed at the absence of

her husband; his friends also missed him and immediately perceived the condition of things. A French spokesman was found who comforted the anxious lady by the statement that Mendota was only an hour's ride away and that her husband could easily procure a conveyance and reach the city in time.

A lone engine followed the train from the Junction and upon this, Laramie secured passage, arriving in Minneapolis a few minutes before the omnibus had started from the platform. The satisfaction of the parties may be better imagined than expressed, when they met and each found the other in safety. Louis had a fine trip east, and we cordially congratulate him upon the selection of a woman who will assist him to bear the joys and reverses of life.
